

Microsoft Licensing in the Copilot Credits Era

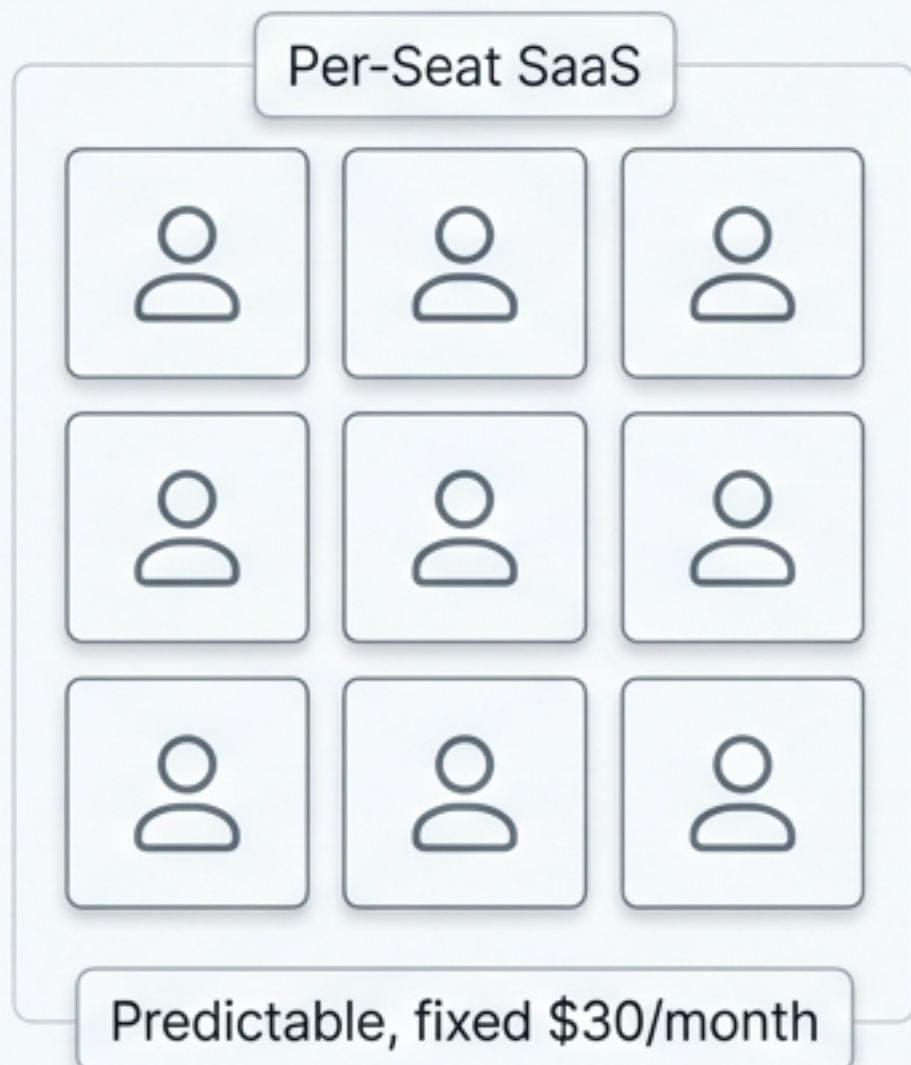
Navigating the shift from seat-based SaaS to AI consumption economics.



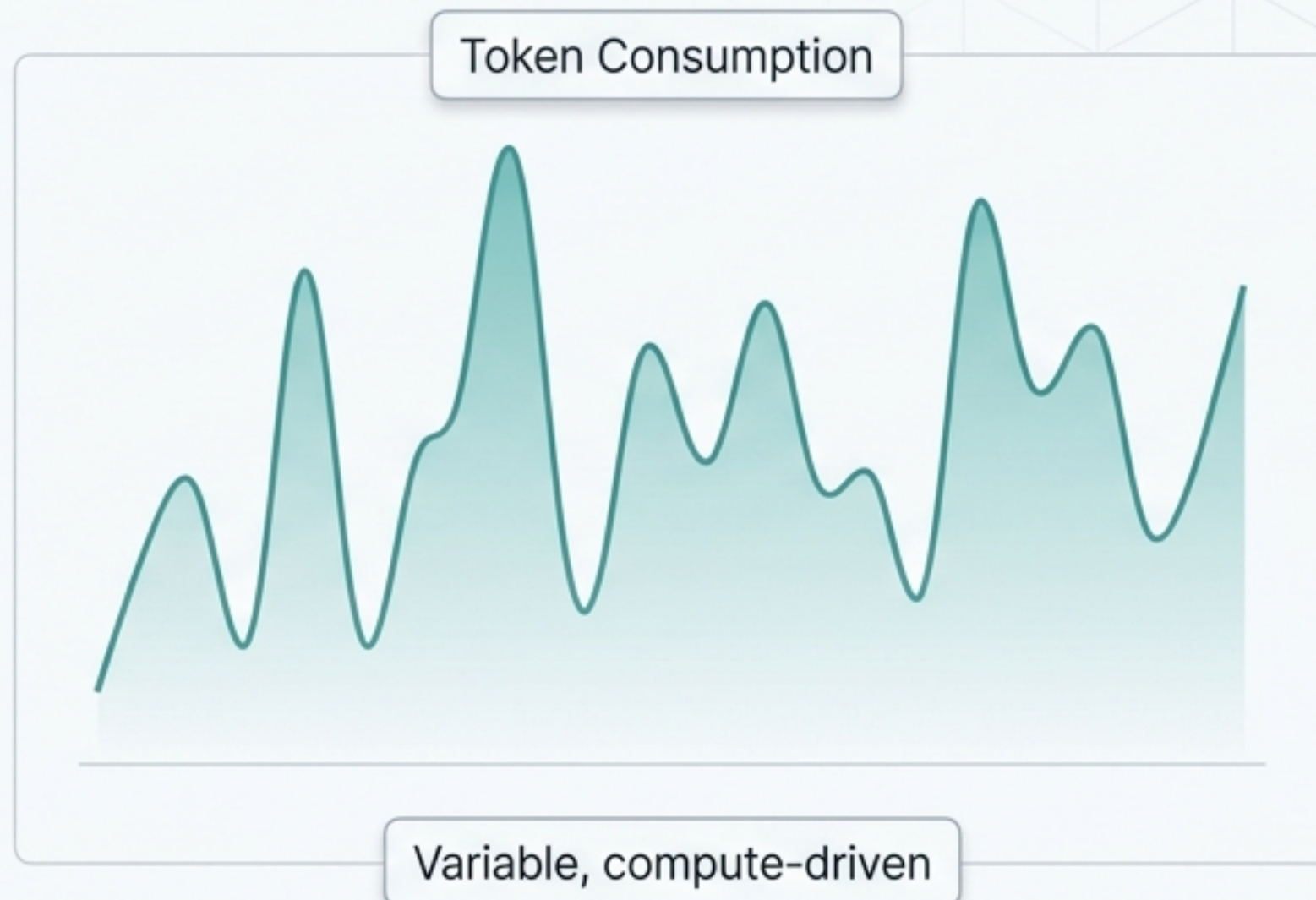
The era of predictable per-user licensing is under pressure.

You cannot sell AI services on a fixed monthly fee when the underlying cost is highly variable model and token consumption.

The Past

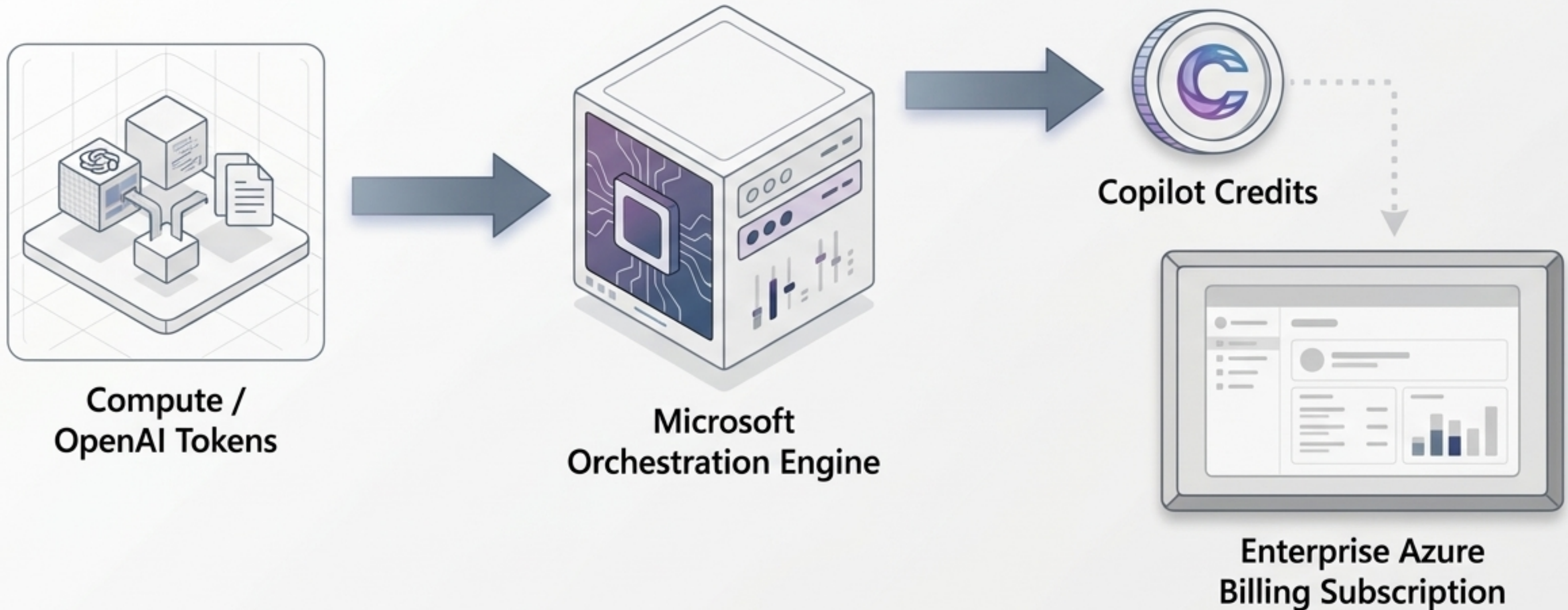


The Present / Future



Copilot Credits are the commercial abstraction over raw compute.

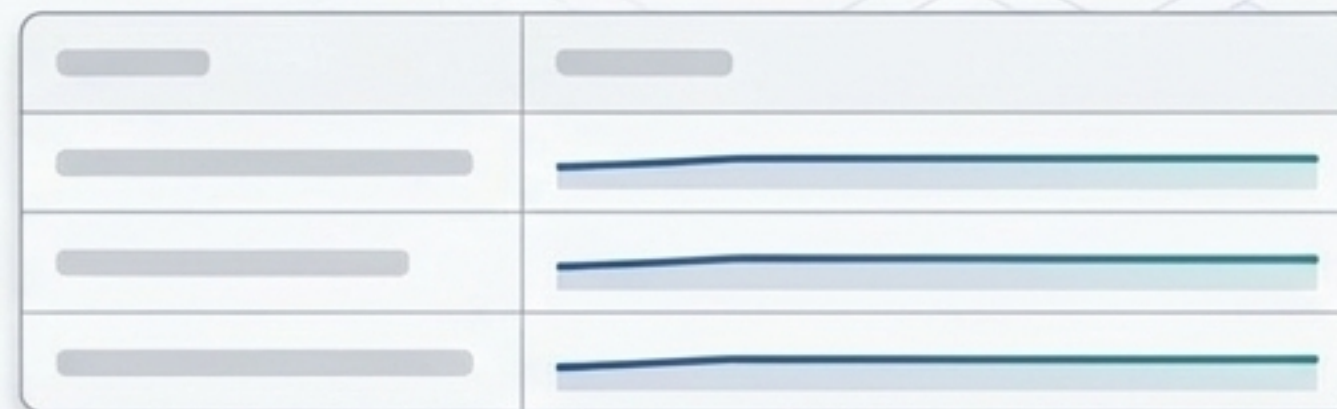
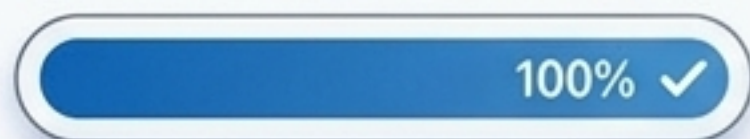
Credits behave exactly like an Azure compute bill, shifting the budgeting risk of API token consumption back to the customer while remaining inside the Microsoft 365 ecosystem.



The unpredictability of information worker tasks.

There is no telling what a 'big' or 'small' task is. Information workers adapt to varied documents and complex prompts. Throwing a prompt into Copilot Cowork is like rolling dice for token spend.

Predictable Operational Task



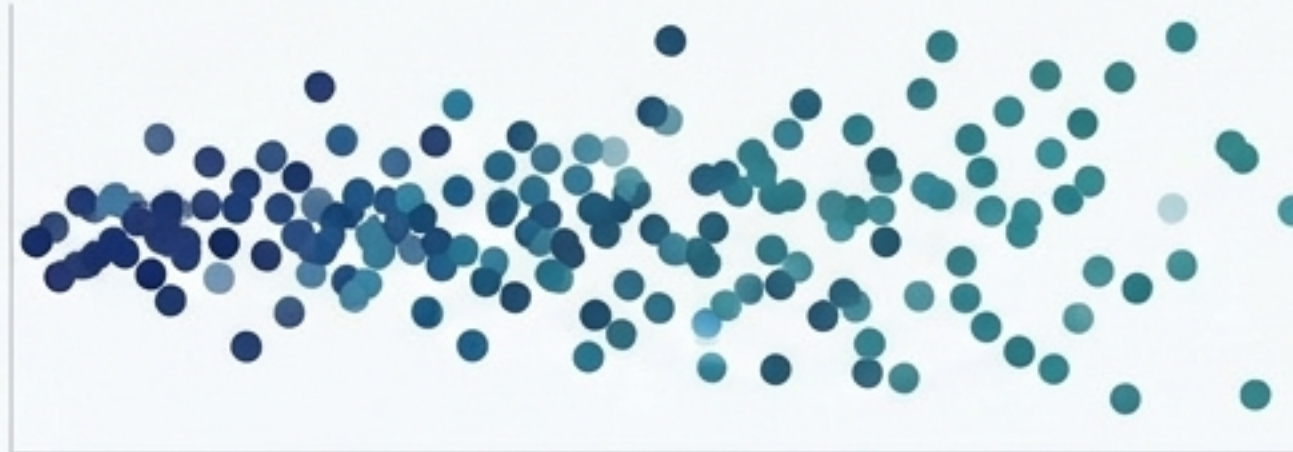
Known database query = static cost.

Complex prompts = variable token burn.

Two Harnesses, Two Radically Different Cost Models.

Standard Harness

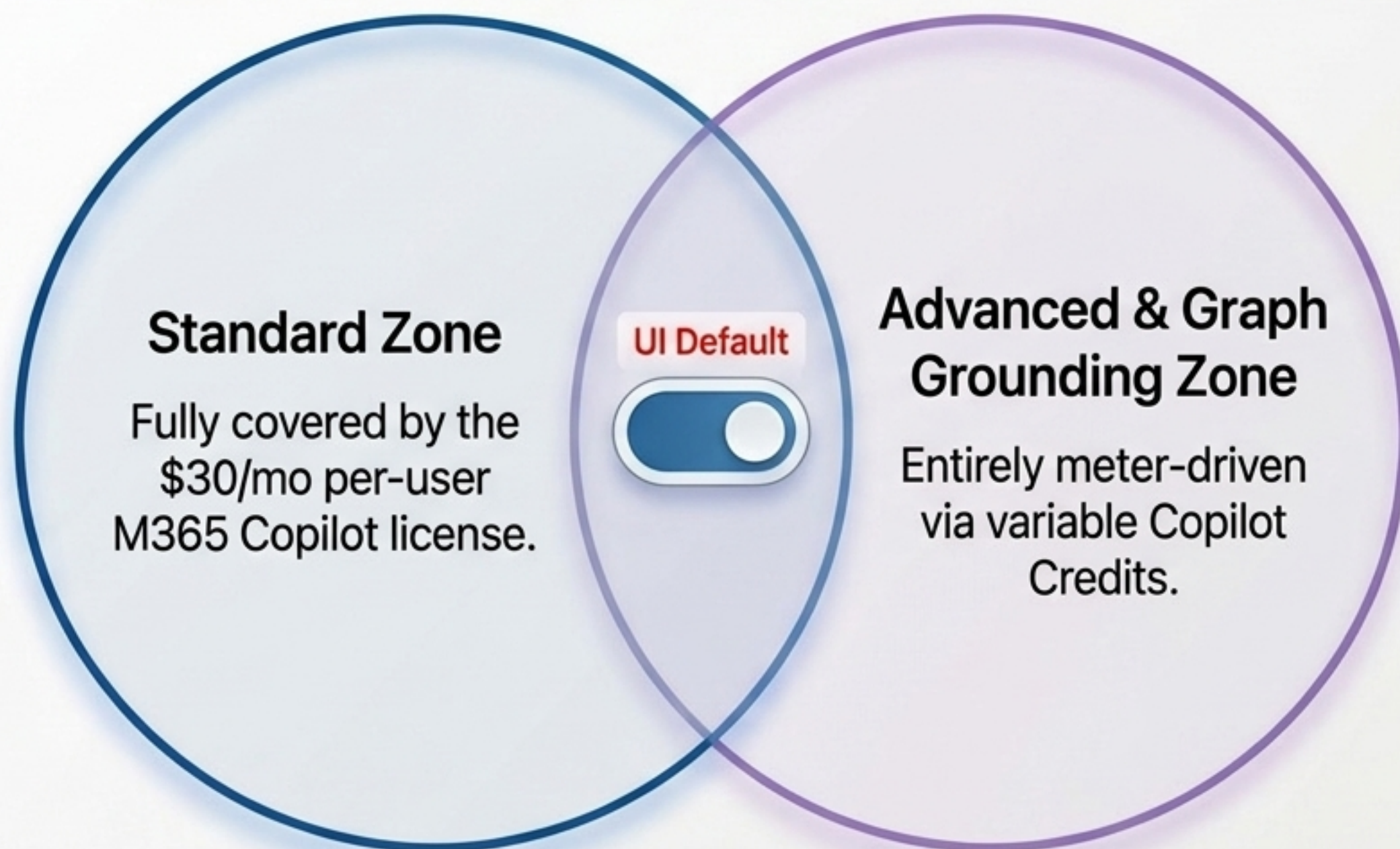
- ✓ Rooted in legacy Power Virtual Agents (PVA)
- ✓ Predictable, rule-based operations
- ✓ Action-based pricing model
- ✓ Zero-rated if user holds an M365 Copilot license

Advanced / GitHub Harness

- Agentic and creative logic
- Utilizes retry loops to achieve complex goals
- Significantly higher capability
- Burns Copilot Credits for every action regardless of existing M365 licenses

M365 Copilot licenses no longer blanket-cover custom agents.

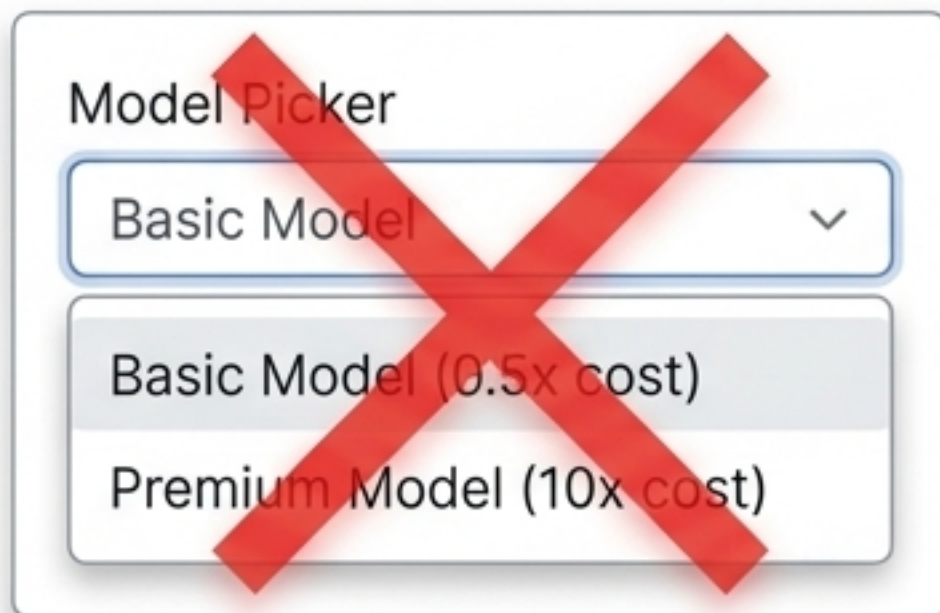
Microsoft Copilot Studio defaults users to the Advanced harness in the UI. Cost optimization now requires intentional architectural downgrades.



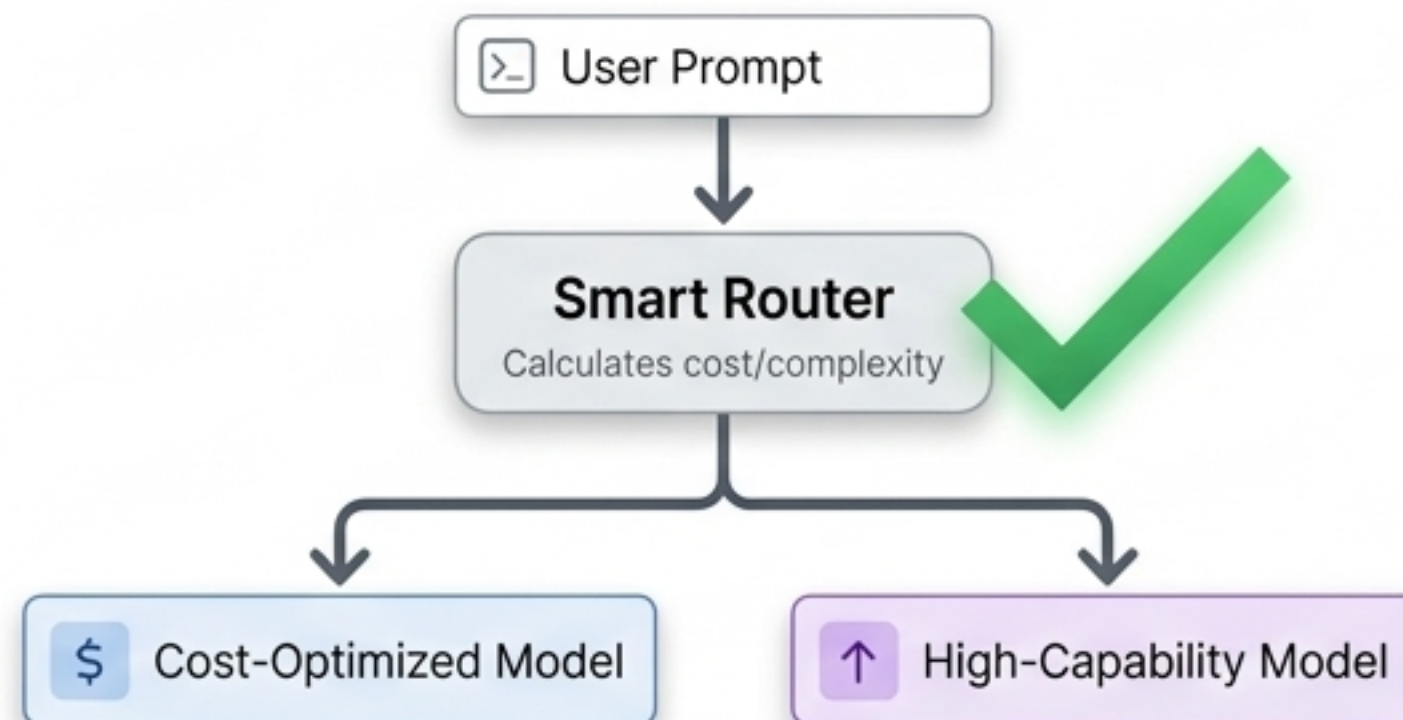
End-users shouldn't manage AI economics.

Organizations must adopt **automated routing layers** to prevent surprise bills, abstracting the choice away from the information worker.

Step 1: The Unscalable Past

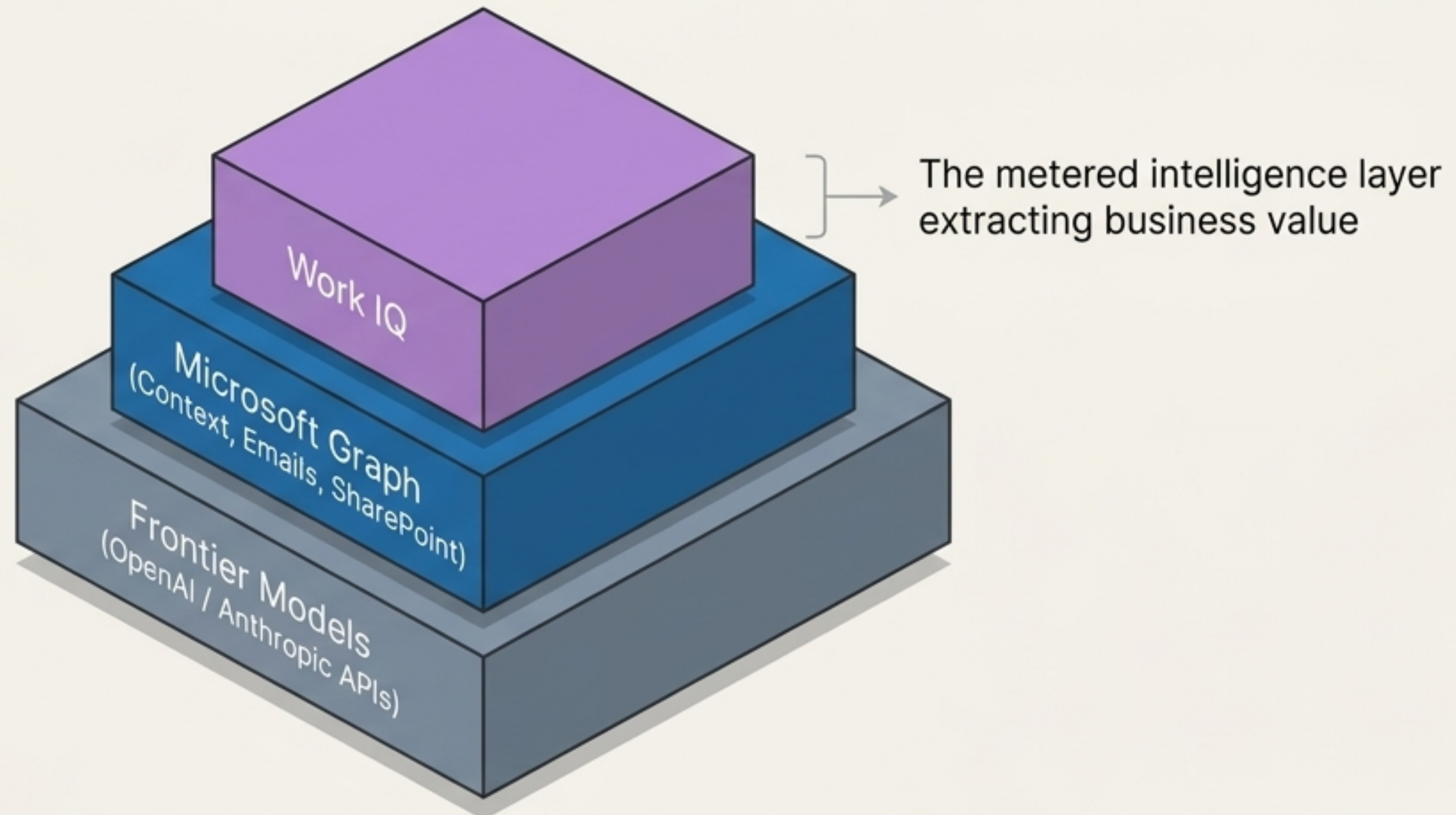


Step 2: The Scalable Future



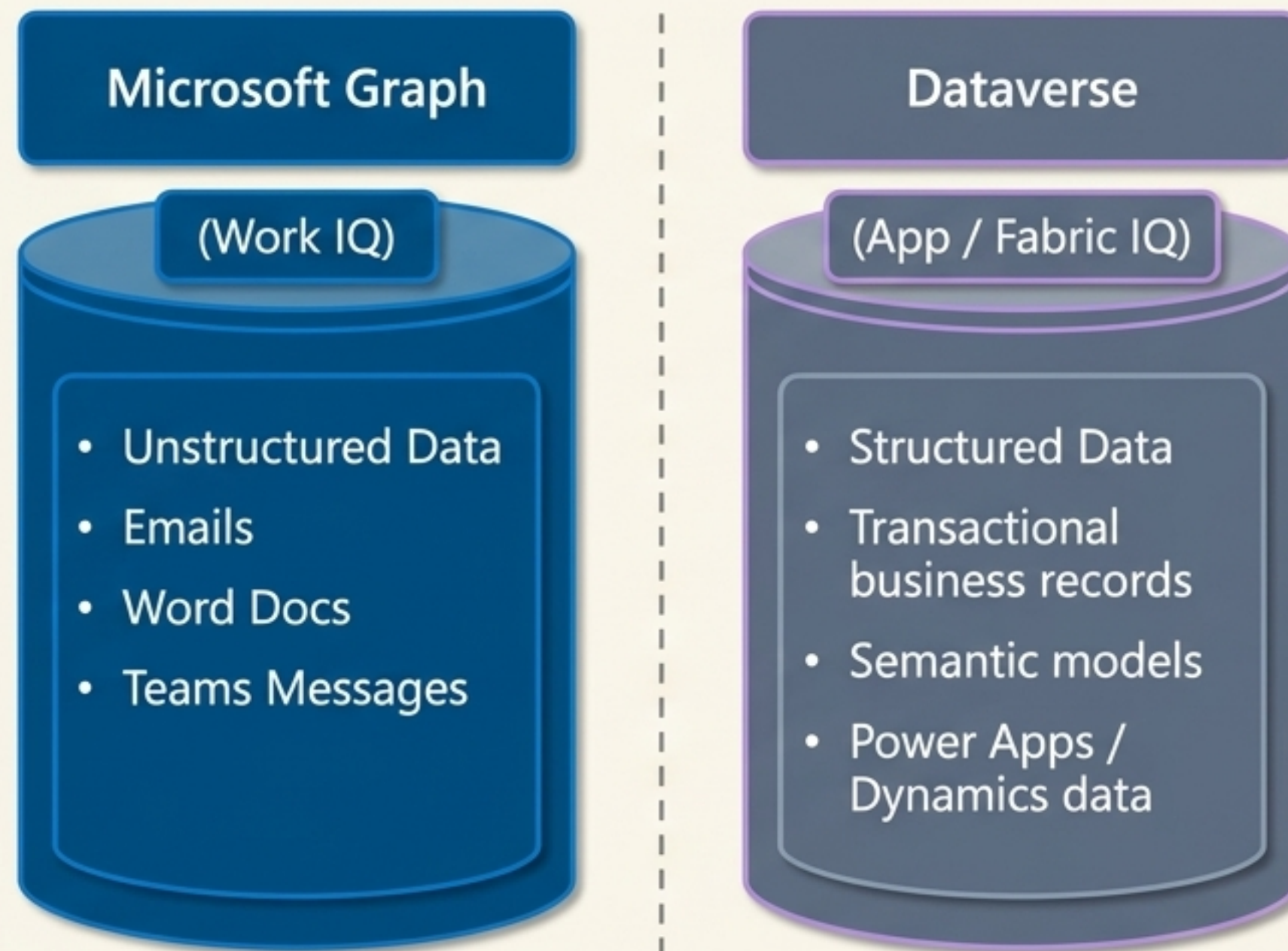
Microsoft's differentiator isn't the model—it's the organizational grounding.

Work IQ turns generic AI into a tool that understands your company's data. However, it is transitioning from a simple feature toggle into its own credit-metered product model.



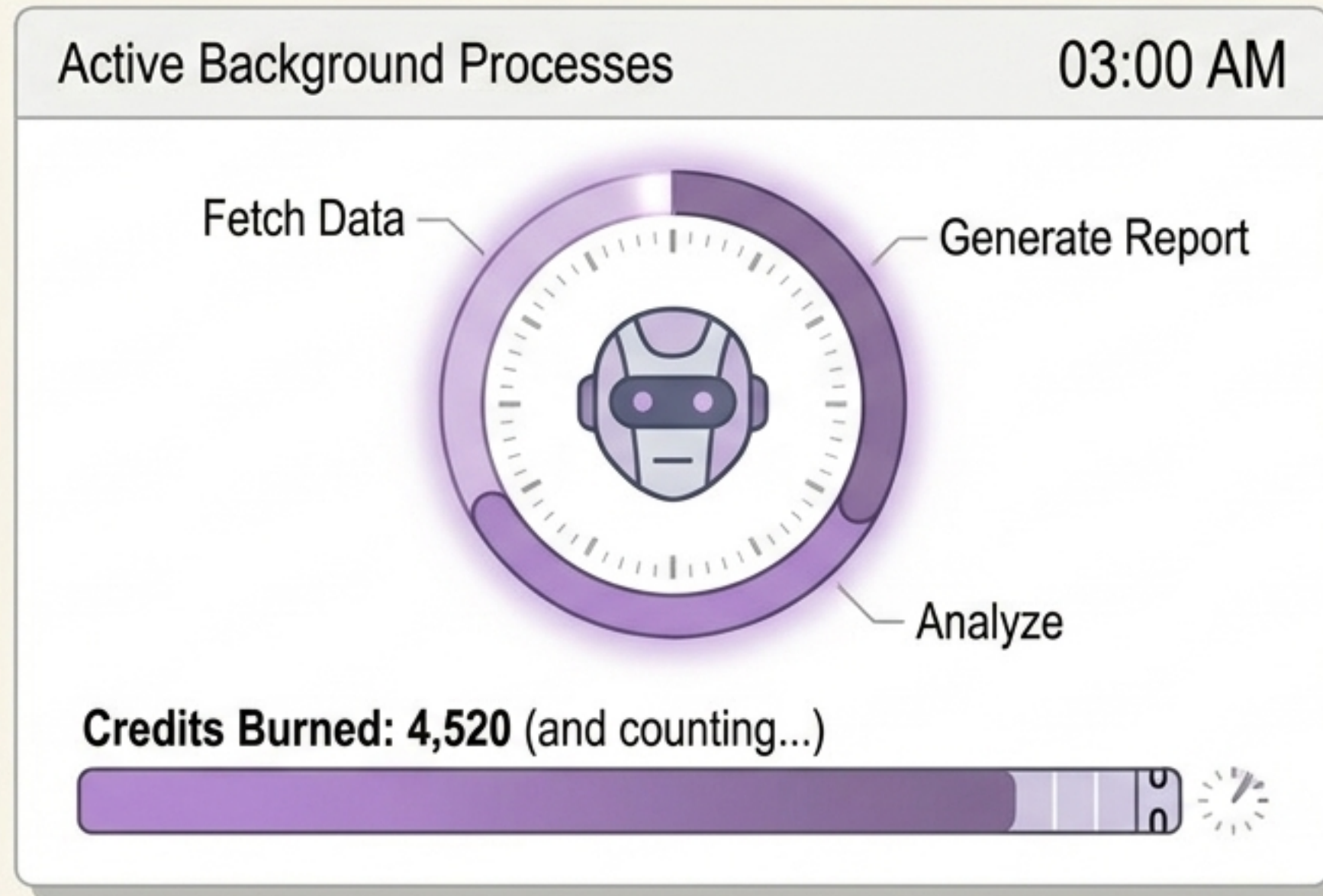
Business data requires a separate intelligence layer.

Dataverse is fundamentally distinct from Microsoft Graph. Expect separate licensing treatments and AI layers (like App/Fabric IQ) for structured business applications and semantic models.



The hidden cost of 'Always-On' AI.

Cron jobs in a container. Continuously running background agents like Scout or OpenClaw provide high (e.g., morning summaries) but introduce the massive risk of runaway token consumption while you sleep.



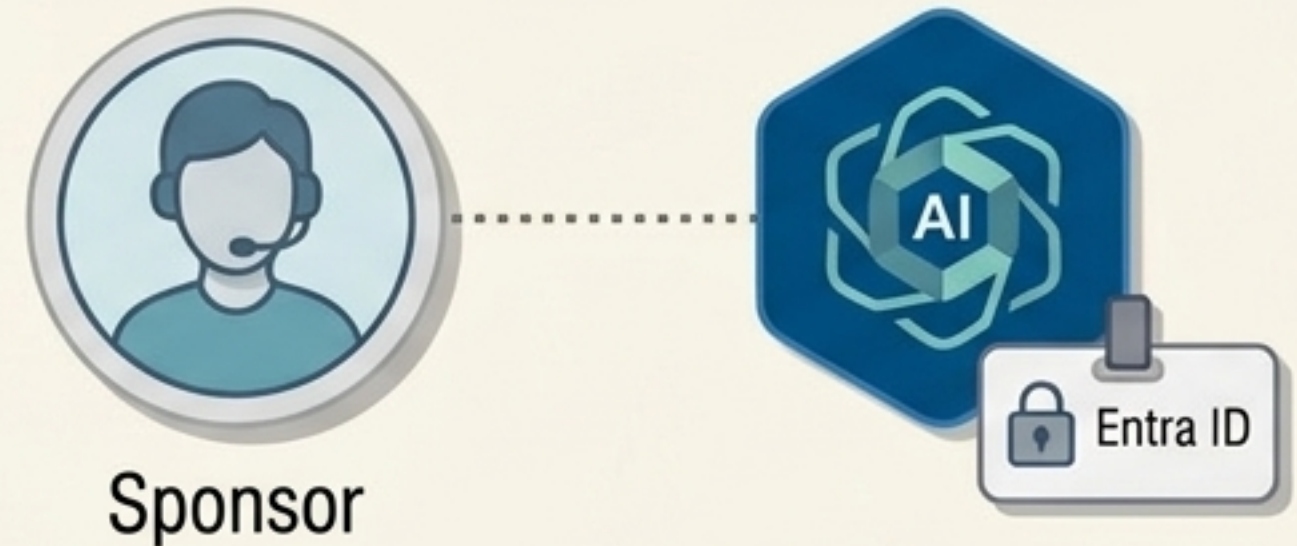
The governance reality of true Autopilots.

Moving past marketing language to the operational definitions of Agent 365 and Foundry.



Copilot

Acts on your behalf, utilizes your specific user permissions.

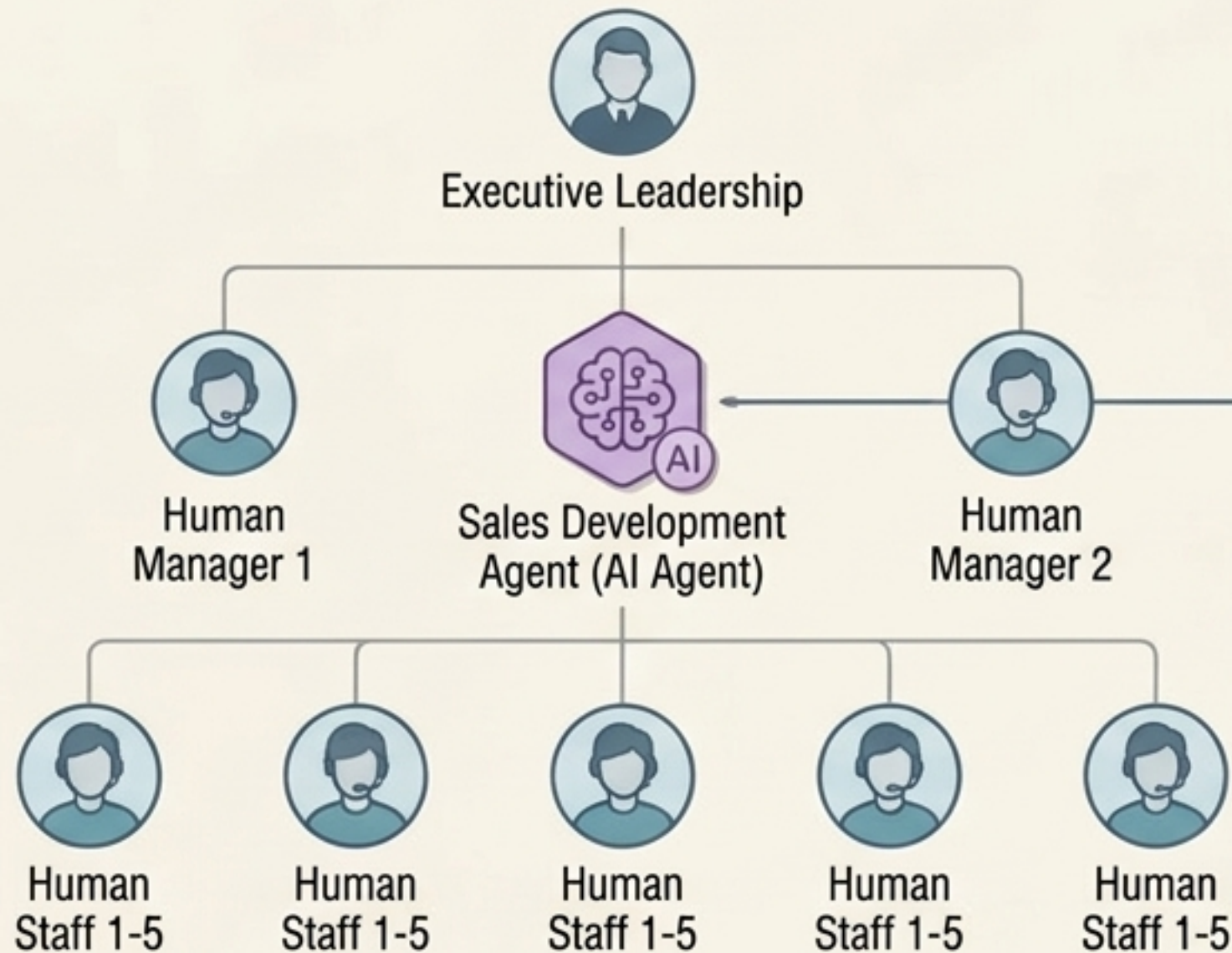


Autopilot

Independent entity, joins meetings alone, governed by sponsor oversight.

Autonomous agents require their own SaaS seats.

You aren't just paying for the AI's "brain" (variable token credits)—you must buy it the "software tools" (fixed SaaS seats) to do its job.

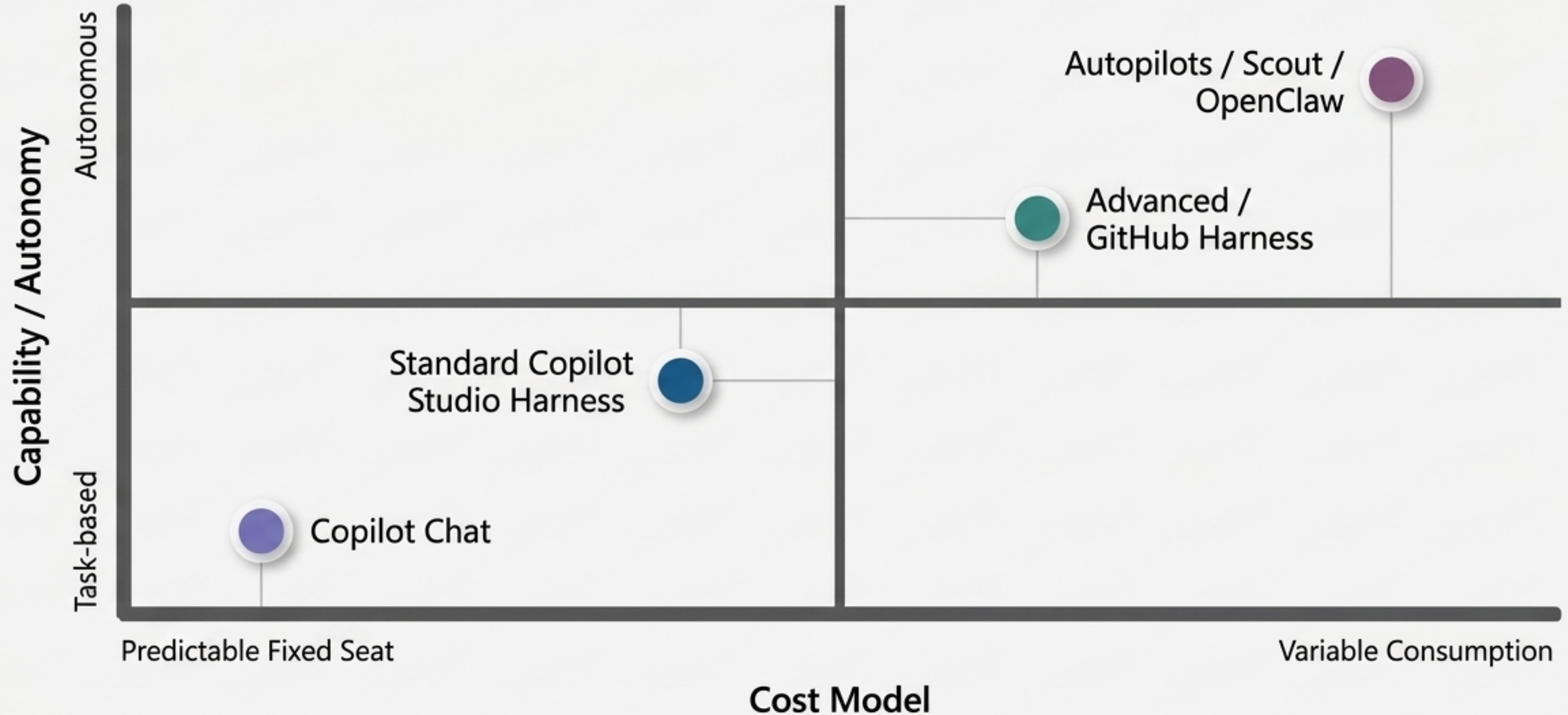

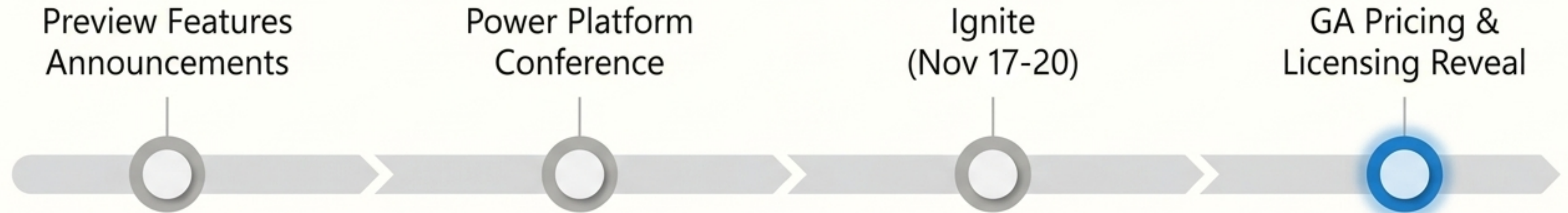
Mapping your AI deployment strategy

Balancing autonomy against financial predictability



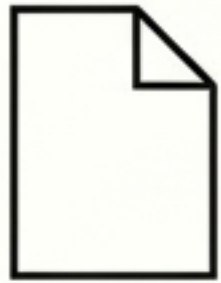
The landscape is still volatile.

Distinguish between a functional preview (exciting technology) and commercial General Availability (where the real financial and licensing models are finally revealed). Similar to Dynamics classic workflows, legacy options will persist.
